A WORD FROM THE DIRECTOR

Doris Klein's essay, "Discernment of the Heart" (see page 2), challenges us to stay grounded in that "inner cave of Mystery where we wait to know the integrity of our call." Please join me in praying that our efforts be grounded in the integrity of our call to serve Christ's mission in northeast Ohio. Here is where you will find us:

Praying with St. Ignatius Retreats. We take this retreat to two different sites this winter: St. Barnabas Parish (Northfield) and Forest Hill Church (Presbyterian, USA). The team for the St. Barnabas (Northfield) retreat began its 8-week service to the 30 retreatants on Thursday, January 8th. The team consists of Joan Carney and Deborah Zawislan (co-leaders) and Pat Dubiel, Peggy Duffy, osu, Jan Leitch, Dottie, Rieman and Karen Zeleznik (Table Companions). The team for Forest Hill Church, will begin its ministry on Sunday, February 1st. Team members consist of: Kathy Haag (retreat leader) and Margaret Balewski, Paul Barbins, Mary Downey, Claudette Matero and Liz Nau. Eric Muller-Girard, a Forest Hill member and also an Ignatian Spirituality Institute graduate will be our retreat liaison, facilitating communication between Forest Hill Church and Jesuit Retreat House leadership. Re-named "Living in the Spirit," the retreat has been adapted for this ecumenical setting through the team effort of Margaret Balewski, Martha Campbell, Kathy Haag and Eric Muller-Girard.

Nurturing the Call. Piloted last spring and recently revised and expanded, Leading Contemplative Group Programs and Retreats, will be offered to 8 participants who are graduates of the Ignatian Spirituality Institute. The 10-part program begins with a day-long retreat on January 25th. Designed and developed by Joan Nuth, Ignatian Spirituality Institute Director and Martha Campbell, JRH Lay Leadership Programs Director, the program prepares individuals to lead Ignatian Contemplative Group Retreats.

CALLED AND SENT SPIRITUAL FORMATION PROGRAM - MODULE NEWS

These modules will be offered during the early months of 2015:

Ignatian Foundations. This module continues as 11 members of the Board of Regents at St. Ignatius High School gather for the fifth of this 7-part module on February 9th. Martha Campbell and Rich Jerdonek co-lead the series. Members of the faculty and staff enrich the program with their input on various topics. To date the program has welcomed the following presenters: Ryan Masterson, SJ and Larry Ober, SJ on the Life of Ignatius and the Spiritual Exercises, Jerry Skoch, VP/Chief Mission Officer, who addressed Ignatian prayer and Dan Bradesca, School Principal, who spoke on Ignatian discernment and the practice of the Ignatian Examen. 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The Christian at Work in the World. One part of this module, "Finding God in Daily Work," will be offered to parishioners at St. Basil the Great Parish, Brecksville beginning on Tuesday evening, February 7th. Comprised of three two-hour sessions and a half-day retreat, the program will explore ways to serve Christ more effectively at work and at home. Claudette Matero will co-lead the program with Sharon Bramante, who designed and developed it.

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Karen Broer and Joan Carney, co-facilitators of the Embracing the Mystery module, hold the participants' "Weaving of desires" for the program.

Embracing the Mystery. Karen Broer and Joan Carney, (see photo above) who collaborated in the design of this program, began its pilot on January 10th with 20 participants drawn from the ministries of spiritual direction, retreat leadership, pastoral ministry and those who have made the full *Spiritual Exercises*. Comprised of three three-hour sessions and an overnight retreat, the program addresses the participants' lived experience of Christ's paschal mystery and their own.

Living Prayer. This 6-session retreat-in-daily life will be offered at St. Clarence Parish, North Olmsted beginning on February 17th. Co-led by Martha Campbell and Amy McKenna, the retreat will offer a diversity of prayer practices and focus on the theme of "gratitude." Team members for this retreat include: Mary Ann Campbell, Patrick Cleary-Burns, John Carlson, Jackie Krejcik and Susan Antall.

Two Modules were offered this past fall. Encountering Jesus Christ, designed, developed and led by Andy Kereky and Discernment and Decision-Making, co-led by Janet Lehane and Patrick Cleary-Burns, who designed and developed this module.

DEEPENING OUR AWARENESS -SOMETHING TO PONDER



Discernment of the Heart* A Reflection by Doris Klein, CSA

As an artist, author, and spiritual companion, I invite you to join me in reflecting on discernment using an intuitive perspective as a basis. The discipline of discernment demands a listening heart and a willingness to trust the deep inner call of Mystery. ...

Discernment is so much more than the sorting and sifting of facts. It is rather the descent into the depths of the soul where we walk into the inner cave of Mystery, intuitive energy, the deep self. There we wait to know, not the answer, but the integrity of the call. Today's culture is fraught with illusions that there is a "right" answer and if we work hard enough and gather enough information and opinions, we'll make the "right" decision. The discernment process challenges us to enter the paradox below the dualistic split of "right and wrong" and listen deeply in the darkness until we hear the whisper that invites us to risk following the movement of Mystery. ...

At the risk of appearing overly simplistic, breathing is the most essential element in moving into deep discerning space. As the body lets go of the breath, we can begin to open our hearts to Mystery, let go of the outcome, and risk the sacred journey. Conscious breathing quiets the dualistic inner chatter of judgment about a "right" or "wrong" outcome and draws us to deeper bodily knowing. The wisdom that resides in our body holds the key to the intuitive. Paying attention to how our body feels when we reflect on various choices is invaluable.

Taking adequate time to simply sit with the question is also essential. We often give limitless time to gathering facts and then move immediately into decision-making without allowing the information we collected to be influenced by the silence. Here in the stillness we simply ask to hear the voice of the Beloved in the depth of our heart. ...

It is God who leads us in this liminal space of discernment. Can we breathe into our deeper self, connect with the evolving Mystery of creation in the universe, and risk something new being born in us? Can we trust Intuitive Spirit to lead us through each decision and walk with us as each choice unfolds into an unknown future?
