

DEEPENING OUR AWARENESS - SOMETHING TO PONDER

Two Models of a Church in Tension By Leonardo Boff

What is the position and mission of the church in the world? To answer this big question we have to understand the two pillars on which the church rests and is built: the kingdom and the world.

The *kingdom* is the central message of Jesus, his utopia of a complete revolution that reconciles creation with itself and with God. The *world* is the place where the church carries out its service to the kingdom and where it builds itself.

The church belongs to the kingdom and also to the world. How should the church live with this tension in the world and in history? We have two different models, in tension and sometimes in conflict: the church of witness and the church of dialogue.

The model of witness states the following with conviction: we have the deposit of faith, which contains all the truths necessary for salvation; we have the sacraments, which communicate grace; we have a well-defined morality; we have the certainty that the Catholic Church is the church of Christ, the only true church; we have the pope who enjoys infallibility in questions of faith and morals; we have a hierarchy that governs the faithful people; and we have the promise of permanent help from the Holy Spirit. It witnesses all this to the world, which will never achieve salvation on its own. The world must pass through the mediation of the church, without which there is no salvation. ...

The *dialogue* model starts from other assumptions: the kingdom is greater than the church and also finds secular fulfillment wherever there is truth, love, and justice; the risen Christ has cosmic dimensions and is pushing evolution toward a good end; the Spirit is always present in history and in good people. God never abandons his own, and offers to all the opportunity of salvation, because he produced them from his heart so that one day they might live happily in the kingdom of the freed. The church's mission is to be a sign of this history of God within human history and also an instrument for its implementation, together with other spiritual paths. ... The *dialogue* model is that of Vatican II and clearly, of Pope Francis. Pope France has set himself decisively on this road of dialogue and humble service to all humanity.
